Here is what sisters Chelsea (age 12) and Abbie (age 8) who recently adopted Alfie, the greyhound have to say:

days have gone by, he has really come out of himself and is always coming to one of us for a cuddle. We know that you should always give a dog their own space. We never go near him when he is

I would love for my children and everyone I know to love greyhounds because they are the kindest, loving, gentlest dog there is.





Key Work

Dedicated foster carers lie at the heart of Erin Hounds' success at matching hounds to home so we asked one of our most experienced fosterers, Sue, to tell us about her experience:

Back in 2007, I adopted my first greyhound, a 7 year old called Fern who gave me my love of hounds and my desire to foster. People said how difficult fostering can be and as someone with little hound experience, I carefully considered the commitment and responsibility but knew my strong desire to help these poor hounds would carry me through the difficult times. My supportive husband, Keith was a wonderful sounding board for ideas as we tried to work out what was best for a particular dog. A fosterer's role is varied but rehabilitation and assessment is the main aim

with patience, consistency and love being the main tools of the fosterer's trade. Living with a hound is very different to visiting a hound in kennels and we learned a lot from each and every one. We have never counted how many dogs (and puppies!) have passed through our care as the actual number does not seem important. Each hound carried their own personality differently; some hid it, some displayed it like a badge but most had sadness and tiredness in their eyes showing us that they had lost their faith in people who had let them down, hurt them or crushed their spirit. Our job was to restore their faith and

build them up to see that trust was once more possible. With every case, trust had to be earned but we had laughter and joy along the way which made fostering so special. When the dog became ready for adoption, we were able to give the adopter insight into their new arrival and guide them through any hiccups during the settling- in process. The sadness turned to happiness as dogs like Ardal, Bailey and Amber (see photographs) left for pastures new and we opened our door to the next needy hound. Dogs live in the moment and when we saw our ex-foster dogs again, there was sometimes recognition on their part but for us it was always a great feeling to know that we had played a part in the process that resulted in the happy, healthy hound before us.

After so many successes, we joined the "failed fosterers club" by adopting Jamie who came into our care as a young saluki, reactive to other dogs. The consistency, patience and love we learned during years of fostering helped us guide Jamie forward. Having earned his trust, the love we gave

> him is nothing compared to the unconditional love he now gives us as the happy, loyal and content hound he now is and whom we could not bear to move on as he has become a much loved part of us.
